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Exercise 8.1 (Back to the start). Write Wikidata queries (link: http://query. wikidata.org/) to answer the following questions from our first exercise sheet:

- (a) Find two siblings who were both awarded or nominated for an academy award for acting, but never acted in a movie together.
- (b) Find three countries with a population of at least one million people whose tallest building is taller than its highest natural elevation (i.e., its tallest mountain or hill measured from sea level). The building is measured from the ground up (i.e., a 3 metre building on a 1000 metre mountain counts as 3 metres).
- (c) Find a German men's footballer from the current team who was born in the time of a FIFA world cup.

Exercise 8.2. Consider the following RDF document with information about celestial bodies.

Specify SPARQL queries which yield the following results in the form of a table.

• Objects which orbit around the sun or around a satellite of the sun.

- Objects with a volume greater than 2 · 10¹⁰ (km³) together with the object if it exists of which they are a satellite. Assume for this that all celestial bodies are spherical.
- Objects with a satellite for which an English name is given, and which furthermore are satellites of an object with diameter greater than 3000 (km).
- Objects with two or more satellites. Assume for this that different URIs denote different objects.

Exercise 8.3. Translate the queries from Exercise 8.2 into SPARQL algebra expressions.

Exercise 8.4. Compute the solutions to the expressions from Exercise 8.3 with respect to the knowledge base from Exercise 8.2 step by step.

Exercise 8.5. The game *Sudoku* is about completing incomplete tables with numbers while respecting certain rules. We consider the following simple 4×4 Sudoku:

You have to fill in numbers with values 1 to 4 in the empty slots in the table so that no number occurs twice in any row or any column, and so that no number is duplicated within any of the marked 2×2 squares.

We now want to use SPARQL for solving this Sudoku, i.e. we want to obtain all possible solutions by means of answers to a SPARQL query. In order to do this, set up a suitable RDF document and SPARQL query.

Exercise 8.6. This exercise focuses on the OPTIONAL operator in SPARQL. Consider the following RDF document:
